Car Seat Checks

Thanks to funding from the Alaska Highway Safety Office and the Alaska Native Medical Center, AIPC's child passenger safety technicians and volunteers conducted 450 car seat checks in Anchorage, Nome, and Dillingham in FFY 14.

Statewide Seat Belt Use Trends, 2012-2014

AIPC conducts the annual seat belt observation study.

2012 (n = 33,111) 88.1%

2013 (*n* = 38,652) 86.1%

2014 (n = 33,766) 88.4%

Pieces of Reflective Tape Distributed to Alaskans Reflective tape can allow motorists to see pedestrians and bicyclists from up to 500 feet away. In FFY 14, AIPC distributed over 27,498 pieces of reflective tape to individuals across the state of Alaska. AIPC works with student groups at high schools in the Anchorage School District to promote seat belt use. At the conclusion of the 2014 Buckle Up campaign, 90.6% of teens were observed to be wearing their seat belt.

Reflectors were distributed to 16,375 ASD students at 38 schools. Reflector use increased from 12% to 86%
