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BACKGROUND & RESEARCH METHODS

Background

The Center for Safe Alaskans (Safe Alaskans) contracted with Hays Research Group LLC (HRG) to conduct this survey regarding attitudes, opinions and behaviors related to driving in Alaska.

Survey Instrument

The survey instrument was finalized after several drafts, which included reviews and edits by Marcia Howell, Executive Director of Safe Alaskans. The telephone survey averaged twelve minutes in length. The survey instrument was carefully designed to obtain thoughtful answers from respondents while avoiding instrument bias. The survey included both multiple choice and open-ended questions.

Sample

The total sample size of this survey was n=389 drivers selected at random to participate in the survey. The respondents were screened to ensure they were all drivers. The ratio of men to women and of age group levels was kept in proportion to state population figures within the margin of error.

The probability is 19 out of 20, for the overall sample size, that if researchers had sought to interview every household from the sample frame above by using the same questionnaire, the findings would differ from these overall survey results by no more than 5 percentage points in either direction. Thus, the margin of error is +/-5.0% for the overall sample. For the remaining subgroups, the sampling error may be larger.

The sampling error is not the only way in which survey findings may vary from the findings that would result from talking to every resident in the population studied. Survey research is susceptible to human and mechanical errors such as interviewer recording and data handling errors.

However, the standardized procedures used by HRG including the use of Computer Assisted Telephone Interview software (CATI) eliminate such errors associated with paper and pencil methods thus keeping the human error potential to a minimum. Interviews were monitored by the HRG Research Director to ensure validity of the data collected throughout the survey process.

Data Analysis & Reporting

Center for Safe Alaskans and members of the HRG team, employing SPSS software, analyzed the data. The primary procedures reported are frequencies and cross tabulations.

Notes to Readers

Included in the presentation of each response is a summary or example of any significant findings, followed by relevant tables. All percentages in the narrative are rounded to the nearest whole percentage point. Often times a few respondents fail to answer a question. Unless the percentage that failed to answer is significant, these people are not included in the totals upon which the percentages are based. Percentages in the tables occasionally do not add to exactly 100% because of rounding.

Cross tabulations describe data that may be related in some way. In many cross tabulations, categories are combined or omitted because the numbers are too small to be statistically significant. This manipulation may change the totals on which percentages are based but does not affect the relationships between percentages. Cross tabulations may be used to indicate differences (or lack of differences) between subgroups of people. When a lack of difference is being shown, a footnote is appended to the table indicating that the differences are not “statistically significant”.

Executive Summary

2021 Research Findings

Section A: Background & Driving in Alaska

The respondents in the study were screened to ensure that they were licensed drivers, and that if they were on a cell phone that they were not currently driving. Sixty two percent (62%) of Alaskans reported driving 100 miles or less a week, comparable to previous years. Drivers of all vehicles remained roughly the same in 2022 from the previous year, with SUVs at 33%, trucks at 31%, and cars at 28%.

Section B: Safety Zones

Nearly four out of five Alaskans (77%) knew that there are safety zones posted on highways in Alaska. Of those who knew there were safety zones, 50% said that safety has improved in these areas, comparable to 53% in 2020. Only 16% said that safety has not improved.

Section C: Highway Usage & Behavior

About half of respondents (53%) said that they do drive between Knik Bridge and Portage in the Anchorage area. Of those that drive in that area, 29% said they often or always drive 5 MPH over the speed limit, while 26% said that they never do. Almost half of respondents (47%) said they think the chances of getting pulled over if you are driving more than 10 MPH over the speed limit in that area are likely or very likely. Sixteen percent (16%) of respondents said they often or always drive 5 MPH over the speed limit on Minnesota Drive, while 39% said that they never do.

Section D: Seat Belt Usage & Ads

Consistent seat belt usage continues to be a choice for most Alaskans, with 90% wearing them all the time. Nine in ten Alaskans (90%) think that getting injured in a car accident while not wearing a seatbelt is likely or very likely. Twenty nine percent (29%) of Alaskan drivers indicated that they thought the chance of getting a ticket for not wearing a seatbelt is always or nearly always, comparable to previous years.

The number of Alaska residents who read, saw, or heard about seat belt enforcement was 43%, up from 2021 (36%). Most Alaskans reported hearing about seat belt use enforcement from TV (45%), or radio (30%). The ad 'Drive the speed limit' (91% recall among Alaskans who had heard/seen an ad about seat belt use in AK) was the most likely ad to be recalled, followed by 'Law Enforcement write tickets to save lives' (23%).

Section E: Driving Over the Speed Limit

Over half (60%) of Alaskan drivers say they rarely or never drive faster than 35 miles per hour on a local road with a speed limit of 30 miles per hour, while 14% say they always or often do. When asked how often they find themselves driving faster than 70 miles per hour on a local road with a speed limit of 65 miles per hour, 13% reported that they always or often do, while 68% report that they rarely or never do. About two out of five (39%) Alaskan drivers think that they are likely or very likely to be arrested for speeding.

The number of Alaska residents who read, saw, or heard about speeding enforcement was 54% in 2022. Of those, most Alaskans reported hearing about speeding enforcement from TV (37%), or radio (29%). The ad 'Drive the speed limit and arrive alive' (40% recall among Alaskans who had heard/seen an ad about speeding enforcement in AK) was the most likely ad to be recalled, followed by "An open road doesn't mean you own the road" (21%).

Section F: Drinking and Driving

Sixty eight percent (68%) of Alaskan drivers have read, seen or heard about drunk driving enforcement. Of those respondents, 58% report seeing a television ad and 37% report hearing a radio ad. The most frequently recalled ads were 'Buzzed Driving is Drunk Driving' (82%) and 'Drive High Get a DUI' (48%).

Nearly two out of three (65%) Alaskan drivers think that they are likely or very likely to be arrested for driving after drinking. Sixty eight percent (68%) believe the chances of being in a collision if driving after drinking are likely or very likely.

Section G: Distracted Driving

Just over half (54%) of Alaskan drivers report that they have read, seen or heard about distracted driving in Alaska this summer. Of those respondents, 64% recalled seeing distracted driving ads on television, followed by 14% who recalled ads on Facebook. Recall was highest for "Safe driving is just driving. Focus on the road and arrive alive" (66%), followed by "If you text and drive, your next message might be your last" (39%).

Section H: Cellphone Usage

Twenty percent (20%) of Alaskan drivers' report talking on their cell phone while driving always or often, up from 2021 (14%). The number of respondents who say they never read or text while driving fell slightly at 64%. Similar to previous years, only 2% of drivers report often reading or sending text messages. Hands-free cell phone usage stayed relatively stable at 57%. Sixty four percent (69%) of Alaska residents believe it is very or somewhat dangerous to talk on the phone while driving, comparable to the previous year (64%). Alaska residents' attitudes about texting while driving remained essentially the same, with a consistent strong (96%) belief that it is very dangerous to text while driving. Thirty percent (30%) of Alaskan drivers believe it is likely or very likely that you will get a ticket if texting while driving, while 73% believe it is likely or very likely that you will get in a collision.

Section I: Car and Booster Seats

A quarter (25%) of Alaskan drivers reported driving with a child between the ages of four and eight in their vehicle. Of those, 77% said they always have the child riding in a booster or car seat. A quarter (27% said they have had a child passenger safety technician help with car or booster seat installation.

About 2 in 3 drivers said they have transitioned their child out of a car seat and into a booster seat because they felt they were big enough. Sixty percent (60%) said they have removed bulky clothes like winter coats from a child before buckling them in. Only 9% said they have allowed their child to ride unbuckled because it was a very short trip.

Sixty three percent (63%) have researched their car/booster seat before purchasing to make sure it was appropriate for their child's age, weight and height. A quarter of these drivers have researched Alaska's car seat laws before.

If they needed information about appropriate car and booster seats or installation, 40% said they would do a google search, 30% would reach out to a fire station, and 24% would ask friends or family.

Section J: Demographics

Fifty three percent (53%) of the sample is male and 47% is female. Forty six percent (46%) of the sample are college graduates. Seventy nine percent (79%) are Caucasian and 16% are non-Caucasian.

Section A: Background & Driving in Alaska

Question: Approximately how many miles do you drive in an average week?

Question: What type of vehicle do you drive most often?

The respondents in the study were screened to ensure that they were licensed drivers, and that if they were on a cell phone that they were not currently driving. Sixty two percent (62%) of Alaskans reported driving 100 miles or less a week, comparable to previous years. Nearly four out of five Alaskans (79%) knew that there are safety zones posted on highways in Alaska. Of those who knew there were safety zones, 40% said that safety has improved in these areas, comparable to 50% in 2021. Only 17% said that safety has not improved.

Section C: Highway Usage & Behavior

Question: Do you drive ever between Knik Bridge and Portage in the Anchorage area?

Question: When driving the Glenn Highway between the Knik River and Airport Heights, how often do you drive more than 5 MPH over the speed limit?

Question: When driving the Glenn Highway between the Knik River and Airport Heights, what are the chances that you will get pulled over if you drive more than 10 MPH over the speed limit?

Question: When driving the Seward Highway between Portage and Anchorage, how often do you drive more than 5 MPH over the speed limit?

Question: When driving the Seward Highway between Portage and Anchorage, what are the chances that you will get pulled over if you drive more than 10 MPH over the speed limit?

Sixty six percent of respondents (66%) said that they do drive between Knik Bridge and Portage in the Anchorage area. Of those that drive in that area, 22% said they often or always drive 5 MPH over the speed limit, while 35% said that they never do. Less than half of respondents (42%) said they think the chances of getting pulled over if you are driving more than 10 MPH over the speed limit in that area are likely or very likely.

Sixty eight percent (68%) of Alaskan drivers have read, seen or heard about drunk driving enforcement. Of those respondents, 58% report seeing a television ad and 37% report hearing a radio ad. The most frequently recalled ads were 'Buzzed Driving is Drunk Driving' (82%) and 'Drive High Get a DUI' (48%).

Nearly two out of three (65%) Alaskan drivers think that they are likely or very likely to be arrested for driving after drinking. Sixty eight percent (68%) believe the chances of being in a collision if driving after drinking are likely or very likely.

Focus on the road and arrive alive” (66%), followed by “If you text and drive, your next message might be your last” (39%).

Twenty percent (20%) of Alaskan drivers’ report talking on their cell phone while driving always or often, up from 2021 (14%). The number of respondents who say they never read or text while driving fell slightly at 64%. Similar to previous years, only 2% of drivers report often reading or sending text messages. Hands-free cell phone usage stayed relatively stable at 57%. Sixty four percent (69%) of Alaska residents believe it is very or somewhat dangerous to talk on the phone while driving, comparable to the previous year (64%). Alaska residents’ attitudes about texting while driving remained essentially the same, with a consistent strong (96%) belief that it is very dangerous to text while driving. Thirty percent (30%) of Alaskan drivers believe it is likely or very likely that you will get a ticket if texting while driving, while 73% believe it is likely or very likely that you will get in a collision.

Eighteen percent (18%) of Alaskan drivers have read, seen or heard about car and booster seats in Alaska. Of those respondents, 59% report seeing a television ad and 13% report seeing a Facebook ad. The most frequently recalled messages were 'Give your child a future; put them in the right car seat (42%) and 'Make sure your child arrives alive' (41%).

A quarter (25%) of Alaskan drivers reported driving with a child between the ages of four and eight in their vehicle. Of those, 77% said they always have the child riding in a booster or car seat. A quarter (27% said they have had a child passenger safety technician help with car or booster seat installation.

About 2 in 3 drivers said they have transitioned their child out of a car seat and into a booster seat because they felt they were big enough. Sixty percent (60%) said they have removed bulky clothes like winter coats from a child before buckling them in. Only 9% said they have allowed their child to ride unbuckled because it was a very short trip.

Sixty three percent (63%) have researched their car/booster seat before purchasing to make sure it was appropriate for their child's age, weight and height. A quarter of these drivers have researched Alaska's car seat laws before.

If they needed information about appropriate car and booster seats or installation, 40% said they would do a google search, 30% would reach out to a fire station, and 24% would ask friends or family.
